At the start of the school year, CLC Coordinator



James Wilbern noticed Karen Delaney, but not in a good way. She was noticeably loud, disrespectful, disruptive, and attention seeking. But Wilbern knew exactly what to do.

He took her aside and told her, "You don't have to be that way." Those seven words were like an epiphany to Karen. She had always believed that, in order to be "cool," she had to act like that.

For the next week, wherever Karen was, Wilbern was right beside her; praising her every chance he could. "I would always say to her, 'You're my favorite now,' and her face would light up."

Today, Karen has made a complete turnaround. Not only is she a positive role model and peer leader, she has recruited all of her friends to participate in CLC activities – her favorites being Homework Help and Computer Club.

"Karen went from a poor student to a model student. And from a high maintenance child to one who is a joy to be around. Transformations like hers happen all the time. First, we build relationships, establishing a level of trust. Then we set standards, which we expect to be met. In the end, the kids learn to be respectful to adults who will ultimately change their lives. Though it sounds easy, it's not. But, with a large dose of patience and persistence, it works pretty much every time."

"She was quiet and shy, and spoke just above a whisper," remembers Kaye Tucker, the coordinator of the Making Proud Choices program. Tucker invited Alani to get involved, and the two bonded instantly.

"Over time, Alani found her voice and her strength as a leader. It is always amazing to watch human metamorphosis: a marked change in appearance, character and function," said Tucker.



By December, Principal McDade could already see a difference in the implementation of the curriculum as standards are embedded in both teaching and learning, and are designed to help all kids be career ready, college ready, and ready for civic life. She noticed a shift in the staff's engagement and focus in the teaching process.

"This is a big deal," she said. "It's awesome for our students and our community."
